Reaching the Next Generation in Kazakhstan

Kazakhstan is a young country that gained independence in 1991. After decades of Soviet rule where the existence of God was denied, many elderly individuals are returning to their Islamic traditions. On the other hand, the youth are searching for truth and hearing the gospel.

From live talk shows that engage the audience about daily issues to more overtly Christian material, FEBC's Kazakhstan team is reaching hundreds of thousands through social media. With more mobile phone subscriptions than the total population (130%), social media serves as an efficient means of reaching Kazakhs dispersed across this vast country (the world's ninth-largest and the largest in Central Asia).

Reaching Young Lives

D*, a young man and second-year university student in Astana, Kazakhstan's capital, saw one of FEBC's videos about Christ and strongly desired to learn more. To find out if there were gatherings of Christians similar to what he saw in FEBC's videos, he wrote to the station. Today D* is reading the Bible and has become friends with young Christians in Astana.

Stories of transformation like these encourage our FEBC family in Kazakhstan, who are passionate about reaching the next generation of Kazakhs. The team sometimes faces threats because of their work.

The vastness of Kazakhstan, and popularity of mobile subscriptions make broadcasting through social networks an effective way to reach the next generation of Kazakhs.

Another listener named A* shared a touching testimony with the team. "I am a student at the university here in Almaty. My parents got divorced when I was very little. I also have a brother and a sister who are older than me.

"Our mother did her best in raising us, while our father was totally out of the

picture. We did not have good gifts for birthdays and holidays like the other kids. I am not complaining, since we learned a lot through those challenging times.

"Now I am taking care of myself. In some ways, I seem to be better equipped than my friends who did not go through such a challenging childhood.

"In a way, I feel blessed by God and now look out to people in need. I love to give birthday gifts to disadvantaged kids. Somehow, I feel God's presence when I do things like that. Keep on talking about such matters on your broadcast."

Please pray for the team in Kazakhstan as they reach the youth in spite of threats.

Heart to Heart

"Vicarious absorption." That's how Mark describes it - how the music and messages we hear on the radio have the power to shape us.

As a child, it was the music his parents played in the family home. As a teenager, it was the Billy Graham Crusades, reading the 'Decision' magazines, and the 'Jesus Revolution' of the early 70's.

Then, as a professional, Mark was on the other side of the equation: salesman at a commercial radio station; account executive at a Christian advertising agency; and once even support act for Andrae Crouch and Barry McGuire as part of Christian band 'Still Waters'! His story is riddled with the words 'radio', 'music', and 'media'.

Integrated Mission Work

Mark is an active member of Windsor District Baptist Church (WDBC) in western Sydney, led by Pastor Jonathan Hoffman.

Mark is involved with the men's Hobby Shed and Fettlers' Shed (model railway), both outreach ministries of WDBC.



Christian blokes and non-church goers are regulars.

Once a month, he drives the WDBC Adventurers sightseeing bus trips, which attract churchgoers and men from both sheds who don't attend church. Gentle conversations about Christianity are happening at the two sheds and on trips.

As a member of the new church pastoral care team, in partnership with his wife Elizabeth and others, they provide additional support to churchgoers who are lonely, grieving, or struggling.

"It's about reaching out and caring for them above and beyond what church folk might be able to normally do.

"We're not counsellors. My wife Elizabeth

is a trained Pastoral Carer and worked in an Anglicare aged care home. If someone needs counselling, we'll get the pastors involved."

Never one to rest on his laurels, Mark's other activities draw on his aptitude for radio, music, and media. He produces church services for Anglicare Sydney's aged care homes.

Earlier, Mark spent six years overseeing Evoke Radio at Anglicare, and in the '80's managed a country radio station. Today he's using his radio experience to create 'Easy Listening Radio', a brand-new station available online. It will soon launch across Australia. (Search easylisteningradio.com.au)

It was his passion for effective care ministry coupled with his experiences in media that drew him to the work of FEBC - God's love in action, through radio. He's rallied WDBC members to partner with FEBC Australia. The church has raised funds for over 200 radios to meet the needs of frontline soldiers and civilians in Ukraine.

But isn't radio obsolete these days? Not at all, according to Mark.

"I've always believed in the effectiveness of radio. 'Companionship radio' means a station can build a relationship with the listener.



"God is doing amazing things through FEBC. There will always be a place for

radio."

"After four years of devastating drought and food insecurity, no one was ready for this," says the station manager of Vox Radio, FEBC's partner in Tana River, Kenya.

Lethal flash floods have swept through Kenva and other East African countries following heavy rainfalls. Some villages have been completely submerged. Sadly, some deaths have been reported and hundreds of thousands more have been displaced. Crops and farm animals have also been decimated.

Thankfully, before the rains arrived, Vox Radio had begun preparing the communities with flood-rated advice and information. When the floods struck, the community radio station became a lifeline. The station listened to the community, gave them a voice, and provided timely and crucial information.

Bringing the Community Together

"We rallied community leaders from the government, religious groups, and the broader network of development workers to share messages of hope, give direction. and reassure the affected communities. This fostered a sense of community resilience and unity," shared the station chairman. Emergency care packs were also distributed.



community through years of drought, and now, floods.

So trusted is Vox Radio that one family rang the station when their house was submerged. The staff promptly alerted the authorities for the rescue.

The team also mentored vulnerable youths when they visited the temporary camps for internally displaced people.

As the floodwaters recede, Vox Radio remains committed to supporting the community. "Even in the darkest times, the power of community-centred media can bring people together and help them rebuild," Vox Radio's Chairman adds.
